
The intent was to enable greater agency, citizenship and responsibility by linking people to the social and ecological systems of Place.





The Distributed Leadership approach


- Leadership is an emergent property of a group of individuals
- There is openness to the boundaries of leadership
- Varieties of expertise are distributed across the many, not the few

Distributed Leadership is

- dynamic, relational, inclusive, collaborative and contextually situated
- Requires a systems wide perspective
- Transcends organizational levels, roles and boundaries

Abstract




Sir David Attenborough has described climate change as "the biggest threat to security that modern humans have ever faced".

Challenges and opportunities


- Impact of the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, intermittent lockdown and international border closures on BSP activities, ways of communication and engagement, online platform

 - advance my engagement beyond the two institutions, increasing the impact of my work.




Recommendations

- 4.Program sustainability: Supporting place and placemaking agenda of the Samar-Leyte Heritage Center.






